



A time for celebration

The Church at Nairn 75 years

The Nairn Mennonite Church, Ailsa Craig, ON, began in the winter of 1948 when several families from the Wellesley, Wilmot and East Zorra area with roots in the Ontario Amish Mennonite Conference bought farms in the Ailsa Craig area with the goal of establishing a mission church. Wilfred Schlegel was ordained as the first minister on March 6, 1949.

The church helped to innovate many programs, including: Craigwiel Gardens, a multi-level facility for seniors in Ailsa Craig, the London Rescue Mission and Valleyview Mennonite Church in London, ON, and the Ailsa Craig Boys' Farm (now Craigwood Youth Services).

While the Mennonite presence in East Williams is small and seen by some as a closed group from Mennonite background, this is not so. There are only a few members who are from the Anabaptist tradition. They have now changed their name to "The Church at Nairn" to dissipate those perceptions and be even more a part of the community. With the closing of the Presbyterian Church in Ailsa Craig, several of those members found their home at Nairn, but many traditions are represented in the congregation.

The Nairn congregation is called by God to be a place where all people:

- are listened to and accepted
- build relationships with Christ and one another;
- have opportunities for meaningful worship and biblical teaching;
- have opportunities for transformational growth.


Congregational Milestones

A time for celebration

Toronto United Mennonite Church 75 years

oronto United Mennonite Church (TUMC) is a Christian community in the Mennonite-Anabaptist "peace church" tradition, emphasizing discipleship, community, service and nonviolence. Celebrating its 75th anniversary in 2023, TUMC was formally organized in 1948 and draws people of many backgrounds from across Greater Toronto. It started as a home-based congregation in the 1930s, serving mostly German-speaking immigrants. It became a mission church in 1942 and began meeting at its current location on Queen Street East in 1956. It has grown to include people from various ethnic and cultural backgrounds. Today, TUMC members hail from five continents and speak many mother tongues. Many are first-generation Mennonites.

TUMC's mission is to be a family of faith that welcomes people with diverse backgrounds and stories, worshipping together and supporting one another, while following Christ's example in working for peace and justice in an urban context. The congregation embraces the full participation of people of all races, ethnicities, generations, sexual orientations, gender expressions, faith backgrounds, physical capacities and gifts. TUMC co-owns its building with Iglesia Mennonite Nueva Vida and Mennonite New Life Centre that supports newcomers and refugees.

Tree of Life/Arbre de Vie - 25 years

The Tree of Life/Arbre de Vie church family is a small group of 20-30 mainly French and English individuals that gather together at the Solid Rock facility on Lake Nipissing from 10:30-12:30 Sunday mornings. We have a interactive format around the circle of sharing, worship, prayer and instruction. The children join in for half the time and then have their own "God Time" together. We also support 12 different missions around the world on a monthly bases.

We have weekly regional Intercessory Prayer with another church in the area. There is also a monthly Men' Breakfast with five other churches in the West Nipissing/French River area who take turns hosting the breakfast in which there are 30-40 men that participate. Tree of Life/Arbre de Vie also hosts other events like a camping weekend, family day activities, worship nights, seminars and other teaching events, family events, etc.



We truly are blessed to be a blessing and are grateful for our small part in the greater church family that is influencing our world by being Light, bringing Life, and expressing Love.

Provisional Membership Congregations

Église Bethésda Mennonite de Saint-Hyacinthe

The congregation began in February 2020 as a result of the church planting efforts of Mennonite Disciples Mission led by Garant Sungura. Begun by one family, Pastor Ayeba Amuri, his spouse, and their twelve children, the congregation has grown to five families with an attendance of 65 (30 of whom are children). Pastor Ayeba has been a member of the Mennonite church in Africa since 1996, and together with the leadership of the congregation feel strongly that being part of MCEC is like coming home to their family. The congregation includes immigrants from Congo, Central African Republic, Ivory Coast, Cameron, and Chad. The language of worship is primarily French and Swahili.

Église Jésus-Christ Appelle Tous

The congregation officially launched on August 16, 2020 in what was only the beginning of a very challenging season. As a new church plant they faced numerous challenges including the rapid rise in rental costs, the Covid-19 pandemic and the accompanying restrictions on public gatherings. As a result the congregation began meeting via video conference, holding their first in-person worship gathering in the summer of 2021. A congregation composed primarily of immigrants and refugees from Swahili speaking countries in East Africa, Église Jesus-Christ Appelle Tous declares their vision in the name of the congregation as they seek to be a church for all people (Jesus Christ calls all).

Gifts of Membership - Symbolism

The mission council assists and encourages new congregations to obtain official membership in MCEC and Mennonite Church Canada, beginning with provisional church membership status. Provisional church membership status will be maintained for a time of mutual discernment and testing for a long-term relationship or, upon mutual agreement, of another direction. After a testing period, provisional church membership congregations are assisted by the mission council to become full status members of MCEC and Mennonite Church Canada.

- Provisional membership congregations are given a living tree or plant. We celebrate and recognize that they are growing and developing.
- Full membership congregations receive a basin and towel signifying their call to receive from and serve the larger body as a part of the whole.

Full Membership Congregations

Hochma

The Hochma congregation has been a provisional member of MCEC since 2017. Planted as a nontraditional (missionary) church for the marginalized, the congregation formed an overnight "out of the cold" shelter just prior to the Covid-19 pandemic. During the pandemic their shelter grew rapidly, becoming Care Montreal, the largest shelter in the east end of Montreal. They have a strong group of committed leadership, serve in an under-resourced neighbourhood and are a powerful example of serving the marginalized of their community.

Shalom Worship & Healing Centre

Planted in 2010 with a small group of eleven adults and meeting at First Mennonite Church (Kitchener), Shalom became a provisional membership congregation in 2016. Today Shalom is a congregation of more than 400 people – and they are young! They work hard to intentionally articulate an intercultural vision even as they are now still rooted in the rapid growth brought by new immigrants from Eritrea and Ethiopia.

Provisional Membership Withdrawn

Bethel Ethiopian Evangelical Church

The Bethel Ethiopian Evangelical Church became a provisional member congregation in Mennonite Church Eastern Canada April 2013 under the leadership of Mesfin Woldearegay.

Provisional church membership status is maintained for a time of mutual discernment and testing for a long-term relationship or, upon mutual agreement, of another direction. Bethel Ethiopian Evangelical Church has been an active part of MCEC over the past ten years. They have withdrawn their provisional status. We celebrate the ministry of Bethel Ethiopian Evangelical Church and bless them as they continue to follow God's leading.

Delegate discernment

Approval of Minutes of 2022 Annual Church Gathering

Minutes of MCEC's 35th Annual Church Gathering Hybrid Meeting Redeemer University College, 777 Garner St. E., Ancaster and Online Friday, April 29, 2022 7:00 pm

- OPENING WORSHIP From the screen, Arli Klassen, MCEC moderator, welcomed everyone in-person and online.
 - a) Land Acknowledgement Herb Sawatzky, MCEC Truth & Reconciliation Working Group, presented the land acknowledgement.
 - b) Annual Church Gathering Theme Arli introduced the theme of courageous imagination. Executive council, along with staff, heard what was said through a listening process and the seeds of that work are being presented this weekend. The courageous imagination process was based on Luke 13:18-21. What is the kingdom of God like? And to what should I compare it? Arli encouraged all to look for God's seeds of healing and hope among us this weekend.
 - c) Call to Worship and Opening Prayer Norm Dyck, mission minister, and Marilyn Rudy-Froese, church leadership minister, gave the Call to Worship and Opening Prayer.

Yoel Masyawong introduced the band from Grace Lao Mennonite Church, Grace New Life Mennonite Church, Lao Evangelical Canadian Mennonite Church and Lao Christian Fellowship. Yoel and the band led worship.

The offering gathered that evening was for the support of church planters.

2. **BECOMING A GLOBAL CHURCH** - Jeanette Hanson, Mennonite Church Canada International Witness director, brought greetings from families of faith across Canada and Doug Klassen, executive minister for Mennonite Church Canada.

Seeds are powerful. They can lay dormant a long time before they grow. What seeds have been sown for us to see these pastors installed this evening? That did not happen overnight. Seeds of faithful relationship building have grown over the years.

Luke 13: 18 - 19: What is the kingdom of God like? It is like a tiny mustard seed that produces a plant so big that birds feel safe to nest. What is the small mustard seed of space that you can create where the kingdom of God can flourish? Where can you create space for God to work, in your home, in your community?

John 12: 23-24: Seeds die by growing and producing food. Anyone who holds onto life just as it is destroys that life; but if you let it go, reckless in your love, you will have joy forever. Do not worry about protecting and saving your life. Go out, use it, spend it and give it away. It is eternal. Jesus calls us to use our lives as seeds that fall into the ground and die to produce fruit. We yield our lives, all that we have, all that we are to God's control and to God's use in this world.

3. **ACCEPTING NEW CHURCHES** – Delegates welcomed six new churches into provisional membership and one into full- status membership. Norm Dyck, mission minister, reminded everyone of the process for provisional and full-status membership. The process begins and continues with relationship. Norm listed the criteria that guide the relationship and qualifies congregations for provisional and full status.

Norm introduced the six new provisional membership churches and their representatives

- e) Goshen Mennonite Church
- f) The Meeting Place

Each church received a certificate and a plant as a symbol of their new membership status.

Pastor Yared accepted a plaque and gift as a token of their full status membership on behalf of Meheret Evangelical Church

Pastoral leadership from each church spoke a prayer in the language they were most comfortable with.

Norm introduced congregations that received provisional and full status membership in the past two years during the pandemic.

Moses Mugisha, Goshen Mennonite Church, performed *Courageous Imagination*, the song written for the courageous imagination process.

- 4. **STAFF INTRODUCTIONS** Yeabsra Agonfer, Wendy Janzen, John Reimer and Stephen Reist were introduced as new staff.
- 5. **INSTALLATION OF PASTORS** Marilyn Rudy-Froese, church leadership minister, introduced pastors new to MCEC or newly credentialed in the past year. She also recognized the pastors new to MCEC or newly credentialed in the past two years during the pandemic. Marilyn highlighted the training these pastors receive to prepare them for ministry. Following a litany, newly installed pastors signed their covenant partnership with MCEC.

Marilyn spoke a word of blessing to the pastors.

- 6. **COMMUNION** Marilyn prepared the community for communion, a new practice for a gathering. Pastors new to MCEC served the elements.
- 7. **ANNOUNCEMENTS** Leah Reesor-Keller, executive minister, recognized partner organizations who were attending the gathering.

The Lao band ended worship with How Great Thou Art.

Minutes of MCEC's 35th Annual Church Gathering Hybrid Meeting Redeemer University College, 777 Garner St. E., Ancaster and Online Zoom Saturday, April 30, 2022 9:00 am

OPENING WORSHIP - From the screen, Arli Klassen, MCEC moderator, opened the meeting. There
was a quorum present to proceed with the gathering. Arli encouraged everyone to look for seeds
that were big and flourishing and where there was fertile soil waiting for seeds, with courageous
imagination, relying on the Spirit.

The listening committee was J.D. Penner and Ben Cassels. Parliamentarian was Aldred Neufeldt.

Yoel Masyawong led worship.

2. **THANKSGIVING ADDRESS** - Janis Monture, executive director Woodland Cultural Centre, presented the Thanksgiving Address from Six Nations tradition. Woodland is dedicated to preserving Indigenous art, culture and language. Janis recognized that churches have a particular responsibility in restoring relationships with Indigenous communities.

Land acknowledgement honours the unique and enduring relationship between Indigenous People and traditional territories. It is an Indigenous practice to acknowledge the land and express gratitude to those who resided there now and honour those from the past.

Janis offered ways of building relationship:

- learn to understand the specific geographic area in which your organization or church is located:
- educate the church on the intent and purpose of a land acknowledgement;
- reach out to the Indigenous community and those in your community regarding land acknowledgement;
- look into actions you can take in the Indigenous communities around you.
- 3. **INTRODUCTION OF PARTNERS AND EXECUTIVE COUNCIL** Arli introduced partners attending the meeting and the executive council that guides MCEC decisions.
- 4. **ACCEPTANCE OF 2021 ACG MINUTES Motion**: On behalf of the executive council, Steph Chandler Burns moved and Brenda Davis, Stirling Avenue Mennonite Church, seconded the motion to accept the minutes of the 34th annual meeting of Mennonite Church Eastern Canada, held April 23 and April 24, 2021. Carried.
- 5. **ACCEPTANCE OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL ACTIONS Motion:** On behalf of the executive council, Steph Chandler Burns moved and Barry Roth, Elmira Mennonite Church, seconded the motion to approve all actions taken by the MCEC executive council for the year May 2021 to April 2022. Carried.
- 6. **INTRODUCTION OF THE SLATE** Gladys Bender, chair of the Gift Discernment Committee, introduced the slate, adding names that were not available at the time of posting the information.

- 7. **REVIEW OF YE2022 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS -** Sean East, finance manager, reviewed the financial statements for the year ending January 31, 2022. He expressed gratitude for the support of congregations. We were very fortunate to be stable during the pandemic. Sean explained the statements:
 - Blessed with the highest individual giving, with an increase of \$20,000;
 - Giving continues to be concentrated late in the fiscal year. He encouraged congregations to spread that out over the year as best they can;
 - The audit was conducted virtually;
 - No issues were noted during the audit and no correcting entries were required;
 - Cash and short-term deposits increased by \$1.3 million during the year due to the maturity of some larger long-term GICs in 2021;
 - No Legacy Fund disbursements were received in the year but MCEC did receive estate gifts;
 - Balance of restricted funds went down by \$358,00 across all funds, largely used to support general transfers to the operating budget and spending on Legacy Initiative projects in excess of new donations received.
- 8. ACCEPTANCE OF YE2022 FINANCIAL STATEMENT Motion: On behalf of the executive council, Rich Steinmann moved and John Finlay, Hanover Mennonite Church, seconded the motion to accept the audited financial statements for the fiscal year ending January 31, 2022 as printed. Carried.

This section ended with a duet from Brittany Anonthysene and Katie Anonthysene from Grace Lao Mennonite Church.

9. **BREAK**

10. **COURAGEOUS IMAGINATION** - Arli Klassen, MCEC moderator, explained the Courageous Imagination journey and the process of how the MCEC identity statement and priorities were drafted.

Leah Reesor-Keller, executive minister, described her journey with courageous imagination. Growing our capacity to dream and imagine other ways of living and living into God's shalom is what the church needs now. We need to cultivate courageous imagination as individuals, as congregations and as a regional church together. Who is God calling us to be? How do we create and dream of new ways of being church to each other in a rapidly changing world? Leah shared her experience visiting different congregations either online or in-person. Congregations' desire to see different ways of being together and finding connection and meaning through challenging times fills her with hope and moves us all into a new stage as a group together.

We do not know what the church will look like in the future but we need to be grounded and open to change to have hope for the future. Our identity statements and priorities are a road map to help us find our way through the next ten years. Our identity sets out who we understand ourselves to be, what is important to us, and why we are on this journey together. Our values set the attitudes and expectations of how we will act on our journey.

Our priorities indicate how we will use our resources to embrace diversity and increase belonging for everyone: seeking peace and justice, recognizing indigenous settler reconciliation, climate action and undoing racism. We are diverse and differ in theology, but what is it that holds us

together? We have chosen to be together and decided to be fellow pilgrims and hold each other accountable. Our diversity is a gift. We are planting seeds in soils that have been nurtured for decades. We are transformed by the love of God, inspired by the hope we find in Jesus and called to action by the power of the Holy Spirit.

- 11. **TABLE CONVERSATIONS** Each table discussed the following questions:
 - a) What are you most excited about? Where are the possibilities for God to show up in new ways here? What questions or reservations do you have?
 - b) Five years from now, how will we know that we've lived into this calling? By planting and nurturing these seeds, what might grow?
 - c) How will congregations look or act differently based on this?
 - d) How might the regional church look or act differently based on this?
 - e) Are there any questions you wish MCEC leadership to address in this afternoon's session?

- 13. **BREAKOUT ROOMS** Everyone participated in the following breakout rooms:
 - a) Finding a Pastor in 2022
 - b) Climate Action Within the Mennonite Church
 - c) Eco Ministry: Deepening Our Faith
 - d) Courageous Imagination 2032
 - e) What in the World is God up to? International Witness
 - f) Palestine-Israel Network
 - g) Developing and Using Land and Territory Acknowledgements
 - h) Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary Alumni and More
 - i) Planting Mustard Seeds at Home "Family on Mission is the music to the lyrics of discipleship"
- 14. **COURAGEOUS IMAGINATION REPORTING AND OPEN MIC** Arli gave feedback on the Q1 and Q5 responses from the table conversations. Some affirmations were: exciting, diversity, healing, welcoming, values, belovedness, Trinitarian identity and hybrid experience. Some concerns were:
 - how to balance diversity with our core theology.
 - What is the place of the word of God in these documents?
 - Is LGBTQ+ included? Why is it not named in these documents?
 - How do we get more diversity in MCEC leaders, council and staff?
 - more focus on youth.
 - Where are 16 missing congregations? Why are they not here?
 - Is mission, peace and justice on the margin or a core priority?
 - How will MCEC resource all the congregations?
 - How can we convey these ideas within our local congregations?
 - These are big ideas. How can we monitor our goals and identify practical actions we can take?

Leah responded to some of the concerns raised. LGBTQ+ people are beloved leaders, members, and pastors among us. That is important to us as a regional body. Each congregation has its own interpretation of the Confession of Faith document and inclusion of LGBTQ+ people. Our understanding of faith is attracting new congregations. We need to keep on wrestling with how we will embrace this diversity. One question raised was about polarization. People from all different ages, generations, cultures, gender identities and sexual orientations have come

together to wrestle and listen to God. We are diverse but together we are being transformed by God's love, inspired by the hope we find in Jesus and called to action by the Holy Spirit.

J.D. Penner, Toronto United Mennonite Church, in-person: One of the questions raised was about how MCEC resources churches. We all are MCEC. We are the church. You are the ones to fund the work of MCEC. These priorities reflect who we are as a collective.

Shannon Neufeld, Toronto United Mennonite Church, in-person: Will there be other opportunities for the churches to speak into these questions?

We are using existing channels and programs at MCEC to connect to and have feedback from congregations. We will be working with more focused groups on different topics.

Michele Rizoli, Toronto United Mennonite Church, online: What resources will be put towards LGBTQ+ inclusion and anti-homophobia?

This topic did not come up as often as others did during our listening process. But it is very important. As we think of embracing diversity and inclusion, we are asking MCEC both internally and more broadly to wrestle with the fullness of who we are within our membership.

Online: Embracing diversity also requires having a strong core. How do you see that dynamic working?

Diversity is the composition of what each individual brings to the whole. Understanding your own culture and background is important to understanding others.

Online: Can race relations and equity be considered a requirement for ministry as Healthy Boundaries Workshop is?

We are looking at how to bring training, education, and resources into the programs we run to embrace diversity. We require Healthy Boundaries training for pastors and will consider anti-oppression training more broadly.

Cedric Martin, Toronto United Mennonite Church, in-person: Will there be an opportunity for youth to be included in MCEC Annual Church Gathering?

We can bring the youth to the main events or we can go to their activity/program and meet them in their own space. It is important to spend time listening to young adults and youth who may not feel it is their priority to attend events like the Annual Church Gathering. MCEC is looking for ways to support the involvement of youth so that it is a positive interaction for them.

Leah presented an image of MCEC as a constellation of congregations, gathered within our differences, with Jesus in the centre, rather than a specific theology. Being united in our differences, in spite of polarization, can be the biggest witness we give to a polarized world about what it means to be a Christ-follower.

15. **BREAK**

16. **ACCEPTANCE OF YE2023 SPENDING PLAN** - Sean East presented the YE2023 Spending Plan. Priorities and the way MCEC chooses to spend money will shift. MCEC will need to make decisions as priorities are put in place.

This is a placeholder budget, similar to last year, with a slight increase. Budgeting for church giving will be slightly higher. MC Canada's operating support is now based on 30% of the previous year's church giving. The internal operating cost has no drastic shifts in programming pending the implementation of the Courageous Imagination process.

Increases in the budget were:

- a cost of living salary increase of 5% for existing staff;
- addition of one new Regional Ministry Associate who is already working;
- information technology spending to maintain computer infrastructure;
- legal/audit expenses;
- a new eco-ministry position from the LiF budget;
- costs to send MCEC delegates to Mennonite Church Canada assembly in June from the LiF budget.

The budget assumed a full 15% draw from the Faithful Steward Fund in support of the operating budget, with an additional \$40,956 to meet a balanced budget.

Andre Wiederkehr, Hanover Mennonite Church, in-person – Please comment on an increase in travel for most of the councils.

Staff were not travelling during the pandemic. This budget is increased to support staff's increase in travel to meet with congregations.

Ruth Boehm, Faith Mennonite Church, in-person – Are part-time staff getting enough hours to qualify for benefits?

The staff person has to be .5FTE to be eligible for benefits. We could initiate a conversation with Mennonite Church Canada about changing the plan design to have more flexibility. Another option is to look at self-insuring which is complicated. Six or seven part-time MCEC staff do not qualify for benefits unless they can combine their MCEC and church hours.

Shannon Neufeld, Toronto United Mennonite Church, on the floor – Is Courageous Imagination priorities not included in the budget?

We do not anticipate an increase in budget this year. We cannot make a budget for Courageous Imagination priorities until it is approved. As we go through the process this year, we can plan for the next year.

Victor Klassen, Stirling Avenue Mennonite Church, online—What is the difference between the LiF and the Faithful Steward Fund?

The Legacy Initiatives Fund was established to hold the money that was distributed to MCEC from the estate of Harold and Enid Schmidt. Because it was a large amount it was decided to set that up separately and to treat it and think about it differently than we would other bequests.

The Faithful Steward Fund exists to hold bequests that we receive from an estate designated to MCEC but not designated for a specific purpose within MCEC. Our policy is to take 15% of that balance each year to support the operating budget.

Motion: On behalf of the executive council, Richard Steinmann moved and John Finlay, Hanover Mennonite Church, seconded the motion to accept the 2022-2023 spending plan as presented. Carried.

- 17. **ACCEPTANCE OF AUDITOR FOR 2022-2023 Motion**: On behalf of the executive council, Rich Steinmann moved and Mark Diller Harder, St. Jacobs Mennonite Church, seconded the motion to appoint PricewaterhouseCoopers as auditors for the fiscal year ending January 31, 2023. Carried.
- 18. **MENNONITE CHURCH CANADA** Arli brought greetings from the broader Mennonite community. Doug Klassen, Mennonite Church Canada executive minister and Gary Janzen, Mennonite Church British Columbia executive minister, gave online greetings. Mennonite Church Alberta will host the nationwide church gathering from July 29 to August 1, 2022 in Edmonton.
- 19. **ACCEPTANCE OF SLATE** Gladys Bender noted one correction to the slate. Matthew Suta took the place of Carolyn Hamm as MCEC representative on the United Mennonite Education Institute board. *Motion:* Gladys Bender moved, on behalf of the executive council, and Mike DeHaan, Danforth Mennonite Church, seconded the motion to accept the 2022-20223 slate with the changes as presented. Carried.
- 20. **Offering** Offering was received for the Leadership Formation Fund to support education, sabbaticals and discretionary assistance for pastors.
- 21. **ACCEPTANCE OF IDENTITY STATEMENTS Motion:** Arli Klassen moved, on behalf of the executive council, seconded by Nate Hope, Windsor Mennonite Fellowship, to accept the MCEC identity statements as presented. Carried.

One ABSTENTION was noted.

22. **ACCEPTANCE OF PRIORITY STATEMENTS - Motion**: Arli Klassen moved, on behalf of the executive council, seconded by Yoel Masyawong, Grace Lao Mennonite Church, to accept the MCEC priority statements for 2022-2027 as presented. Carried.

One NO was noted.

23. **CLOSING WORSHIP** - John Reimer, operations director, thanked the staff who worked to make this event happen. SoundBox Productions did a tremendous job of the broadcast. Redeemer University provided an excellent facility and service. Luke Fillion was the official photographer. John thanked each one for attending.

Worship Team ended with "Great is Thy Faithfulness." Arli concluded with a sending prayer.

Gratitude:

We thank God for the financial generosity within our MCEC community, congregations and individuals who contribute faithfully on an annual basis, and those who contribute through their legacy gifts of bequests. MCEC programming relies on both sources of funding.

The annual spending plan and annual financial reports show how these annual contributions are used to support initiatives across our faith community. We are thankful for your faithful generosity, the cloud of witnesses enabling MCEC to carry out activities that support congregations and their leaders.

MCEC also relies on a number of separate funds to provide financial support for special initiatives as well as transfers to annual operations.

Bequest contributions are placed, by policy, into the Faithful Steward Fund, and then policy is followed for fund transfers into the annual Operating Fund. The Faithful Steward Fund has been growing in recent years, for which we thank God. This means there is more than enough money for a fund transfer in both YE2023 and YE2024, in order to cover planned expenses to meet our strategic priorities. This is a wonderful gift!

Historical Context:

Just over 10 years ago, MCEC received news that we would be one of the recipients of a major new bequest. A new policy was created, the Legacy Initiatives Fund (LiF) policy, to manage this large bequest, with a dual focus, and the intention was to spend it all within a ten-year period.

The criteria, established in 2012, included:

- Entrepreneurial spending: MCEC provided internal and external grants for a total of \$5.2 Million on these entrepreneurial projects, out of the Legacy Initiatives Fund. MCEC successfully invested in a wide number of initiatives that will continue to impact our future;
- Tithing: MCEC contributed a tithe to the wider church, as well as a tithe to the Faithful Steward Fund and a tithe to the Mission Disbursement Fund. MCEC has spent a total of \$3.5 Million on these three tithes.

The total amount spent over the last 10 years is much larger than had been anticipated at the start. There is now the understanding that MCEC could receive a comparable or larger amount from this bequest in the next few years than we have previously received. New grants have been on hold for the last couple of years as we realized that the size of the bequest will be several times larger than anticipated.

Update and New Directions

Present Context:

The world has changed since the LiF policy was created. In addition to a considerably larger bequest than anticipated, we faced a worldwide pandemic that changed our economy and also hastened trends we were seeing in our churches prior to 2020, including but not limited to, changing giving patterns in both MCEC congregations and beyond.

Proposed New Direction:

The 2012 LiF Policy was created with a focus on entrepreneurial spending. Today, in 2023, the financial landscape has changed, and this reality twinned with a considerably larger bequest than anticipated compelled the MCEC executive team and executive council to prepare for a change in the approach and policy to the LiF.

As the MCEC community continues to navigate change, we believe that a **revised approach**, focused on providing a steady revenue stream from investing this bequest, will provide **sustainable long-term benefit** to the entire MCEC community. **The plan is to:**

- 1. Continue to tithe from the bequest to the wider church;
- 2. Provide an annual source of small grants;
- 3. Invest the rest in a way that will provide a steady annual income stream to MCEC, along with the annual contributions from congregations and individuals.

In summary:

MCEC executive council and staff are building a long-term funding strategy for MCEC. This strategy relies first on the faithful and generous contributions from congregations and individuals. It will be supplemented by an annual income stream from bequests. The policy will be updated to make this possible and help provide long-term stability via all bequests no matter their size.

We thank God for the generosity of all donors, who make it possible for the vitality of the collaborative ministry we have through MCEC as we energize congregations, encourage leaders and embody God's reconciling ministry for all creation!

- The Mission Office team of Norm Dyck (Mission Minister), Michel Monette (Mission Catalyzer for Quebec and Ottawa), and Fanosie Legesse (Intercultural Mission Minister), along with Mission Associate Yoel Masyawong, assist the development of 20 Provisional (Emerging) Churches as they grow into Full Membership within MCEC.
 - ~ Walk alongside 16 Church Plants actively exploring a greater connection with MCEC

 - ~ With the 2023 budget, we are excited to make the Catalyzer position in Quebec a permanent staff position (moving from a project supported by LiF), as well as adding two Mission Associates in Quebec, to assist in the rapid growth of church planting ministry in the region.
- Since the 2022 Annual Church Gathering, the Mission Office team has connected with more than 60 congregations during their regular worship times

Eco-ministry (Navigating Change, Seeking Peace & Justice)

- Wendy Janzen serves as the MCEC Ecominister in a 0.25FTE role, serving as both a leader and resource to MCEC congregations in discerning creation care theology.
- Over the past year, Wendy has provided resourcing to congregations in their faith response to creation care and environmental sustainability opportunities through 13 worship engagements and 11 workshops and panel discussions
- With the 2023 budget, we are excited to be able to increase Wendy to 0.50FTE as leaders and congregations seek more resourcing in creation care theology.

- Fanosie Legesse serves as the Intercultural Mission Minister, seeking to advance an Anabaptist missiology throughout MCEC that inspires and supports MCEC to become an intercultural disciple-making community that is aligned with God's mission in our world.
- Over the past year, Fanosie has shared in eight worship gatherings and several workshops focused on the theme of developing an intercultural church identity.

International Witness (Navigating Change, Developing Leaders, Embracing Diversity, Seeking Peace & Justice)

- Together with the four regions of Mennonite Church Canada, we are growing vibrant global church relationships in more than 15 countries. Mennonite World Conference reports that 84% of its related bodies are outside of Europe and North America. MCEC reflects a similar reality in that fully 25% of our congregations name countries of origin outside Europe and North America.

- Through our global church connections, we are being both invited and challenged to embrace diversity, seek peace and justice, develop new leadership paradigms and together consider how God is calling us together to be a reconciling presence in the world.
 - ~ In 2022, MCEC staff made global church connections in Ethiopia, Thailand, Laos and Philippines.
 - At the Annual Church Gathering, Bock Ki and Sook Kyoung, Witness Workers in South Korea will join us as yet another reminder of our vital connection to the global church.

In the spirit of Acts 2, Christ continues to add to the church daily.

Inspirational Glimpses...

- While the Covid pandemic has greatly impacted church-wide worship attendance, we have seen the perseverance of church planters. Some church plants lost their worship space and were able to regain it or find new space. Others have returned to their previous pattern of consistent growth by adapting their meeting to accommodate more attendees. In the spirit of Acts 2, Christ continues to add to the church daily.
- Shalom Worship & Healing Centre is incredibly intentional about discipling their children. Each generation of children is given a name/title to indicate the calling and vision of the congregation for them:
 - Joshua to carry the faith of their parents into a new land
 - Bridge to connect Canadian and Eritrean cultures and serve as a bridge to bring greater understanding
 - Timothy to learn from the older leaders, while already fully culturally translating into a new cultural context

Currently their adults worship at Chin Christian Church as they actively search for a worship space to accommodate their 400 members! They anticipate that one day parents and children will worship together in one worship space.

- ~ Shalom is intentionally articulating an intercultural vision even as they are now still rooted in the rapid growth brought by new immigrants from Eritrean and Ethiopia. Baptising as many of 20 new believers every year, the Tigrinya speaking generation is focused on reaching the 8,000+ Tigrinya speakers in the Waterloo Region, while the children are being shaped with the vision to reach the nation! Developing leaders and cultivating intergenerational discipleship is at the core of Shalom's inspiring mission.
- In February, Wendy and three pastors/leaders from MCEC began a year-long program sponsored by Anabaptist Climate Collaborative. Through worship, workshops and hands-on experiences they were inspired to imagine ways to work at climate action in their ministry setting. Each are creating a project for the year that will engage their congregation, and by extension MCEC, to live into God's shalom for all creation.
- Fanosie observes that the congregations of MCEC are ready to accept the reality that it is time for the church to more fully reflect its societal context. We desire to become congregations open in both a physical and spiritual sense to people of all nations, cultures, languages and ethnicities.

We embrace the diversity of Mennonite/Anabaptist faith expression among us.

For Reflection and Prayer...

Invited to pose a question for discussion during the January meeting of the MCEC Executive Council, the Mission Council invited reflection on why MCEC seeks to continue to build relationships with new congregations.

While not all new church plants are new Canadians, fully 25% of MCEC congregations represent an ethnicity other than Mennonite Church/General Conference roots. For the most part these congregations are growing both in numerical size, but also in their Canadian cultural understanding. Along the way MCEC is being invited to navigate change together as we embrace the diversity of Mennonite/Anabaptist faith expression among us.

The majority of our focus and attention has been in the area of helping congregations and pastors navigate the changes needed for this season, as well as supporting pastors to continue to develop and grow in their leadership. We are grateful for the many people with whom we journey, and for the presence of the Holy Spirit who enlivens and gives grace and hope.

Resourcing of pastors and congregations

 In the past year the Leadership office, particularly through the Regional Minister office, has resourced 28 congregations with more involved questions and processes working with 36 different items, related to transitions and congregational discernment/visioning processes. This is in addition to phone calls

- The Regional Minister is also providing ongoing coaching and encouragement to a number of pastors as the need and opportunities present themselves in both formal and informal arrangements.
- The Regional Ministry Associates have made a pastoral contact at least once with the majority of the pastors in active ministry through this time frame.
- The Church Leadership Minister met with pastors seeking vocational discernment or support and individuals exploring a call to ministry.

Credentialing

- The Church Leadership Minister worked with the Leadership Council to credential pastors. (See details in the Pastoral Ministry Transitions section.)
- The Church Leadership Minister and the Regional Minister led installation services. The CLM also led License toward Ordination and Ordination services.

TiM (Transitioning into Ministry)

 15 participants have the opportunity to grow in their pastoral identity within a coaching group, attending in-person retreats twice a year, engaging speakers from MCEC partners and pastors and meeting with a mentor.

Learning Commons

 2022/23 was the first year the Learning Commons was able to present a full slate of events for the pastors, chaplains and congregational leaders of MCEC. Craig Janzen Neufeld, Interim Supply Pastor at Vineland United Mennonite Church:

I am currently being inspired by wondering what God might be calling the church to as we emerge (we hope) from the pandemic. In the last number of years, the church has had to shift its approach to ministering globally. In mid-November I attended a workshop in Mennonite Church Eastern Canada entitled the "Wheat and Weeds Challenge." Presenter Robert (Jack) Suderman, former General Secretary of Mennonite Church Canada asked us the question "why?" Why do we go to all this effort to gather as faith communities? Why do we think that any effort on our part is going to change the trajectory of this world?


With the ongoing difficulties of the pandemic, record high inflation, and instability in our health care and education systems, it's easy to frame church as just another bottomless pit sucking away our time and energy. Also tugging on our heart strings are the ongoing discoveries of unmarked graves found at Indian Residential School sites, the war in Ukraine, climate crisis. It can all get overwhelming.

Indeed, listening only to the news suggests our efforts are not changing the trajectory of the world at all. But despair not! Jesus' first words in the gospel of Mark are, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent and believe the good news." In other words, "Change your minds, refocus, the reign of God is arriving!"

I want to share with you some of this good news — news you won't learn from the major networks in their year-end highlight reels of 2022.

Witness workers Werner and Joanne De Jong overcame several hurdles with visa issues to serve Meserete Kristos Seminary in Ethiopia with their teaching gifts. We are again dipping our toes into youth service opportunities, with Sarah Wood helping teach English to children in Thailand under the guidance of Tom and Christine Poovong. Bock Ki Kim (Sook Kyoung Park) facilitated peaceful conflict resolution for 18 middle school classes in a Seoul school. Gerald and Rie Neufeld are in Japan to reconnect and revitalize churches there. Nor will you find news about how the Palestine Israel Network, with representatives from four regional churches, are hosting speakers to challenge beliefs about living in that part of the world.

No radio stations will report that our church regions are embracing the journey of reconciliation with Indigenous peoples and eco-harm with the help of the newly appointed Jonathan Neufeld (Indigenous Relations Coordinator), and Sandy Plett (Climate Action Coordinator).

Serving in a small Christian school is providing her with opportunities and challenges that will build cross cultural skills, leadership capacity and faith formation. 

Climate Action

The journey to this work as Climate Action Coordinator has been an interesting one! I grew up loving the outdoors, being a thrifty shopper and a gardener. In recent years, my passion for the church and growing concern about climate change led me to explore my personal role in the struggle for climate justice. I began looking for ways that I could lend my gifts and skills to the work.

Through the ecumenical initiative called For the Love of Creation, I started leading Faithful Climate Conversations locally. These guided discussions help participants move through anxieties and experiences of climate crisis and consider ways that they might take action. This work led me to get involved with the Mennonite Church Manitoba Climate Action Working Group in 2021, and now and as Climate Action Coordinator for Mennonite Church Canada.

I hope to facilitate connections between the regions of MC Canada around the important and diverse work of addressing the climate crisis. Across the country, groups within our church families are working at this in different ways. I'm excited to lift the themes and threads of this work into the light, and share them with all of you.

I'm eager to learn what shape climate action is taking in your church, and in your region. What a gift to be able to support and encourage the hands and feet of Christ in this way!

Indigenous Relations

Greetings Church! As a community minister for Seattle Mennonite Church over the past 15 years, I had the regular privilege of welcoming volunteers who engaged with people experiencing injustice. I would often say that they should be ready to be surprised by the welcome and trust that community members would immediately extend. This welcome is rooted in the trust and presence seeded by all the efforts that have gone before them. While they are present, whether it is a day or a year, people are inheriting this trusted memory and adding their own good intentions and actions to strengthen these relationships. We are all just stepping into a stream that has been flowing before we showed up and will continue to flow after we have stepped away.

In that same spirit, I am struck (but not surprised) by the expressions of blessing, gratitude, openness, connection and collaboration I have received — even in just the first few weeks of inhabiting the role of Indiegneous Relations Coordinator. It is a testimony to the trusted relationships formed by passionate and gifted people who have represented MC Canada in this way.

I have been focusing on connecting with the Executive Ministers and Regional Indigenous Relations Working Groups of our church in these early days, hearing about common concerns and questions we are facing as we seek to walk the path of reconciliation with Indigenous neighbours. The

Mennonite Church Manitoba - Year in Review 2022

Thirty-nine congregations across Manitoba covenant together to be Mennonite Church Manitoba, coming together for mutual support and shared ministry. Five regional churches, including MCM, covenant together to be Mennonite Church Canada, likewise coming together for mutual support and shared ministry. We are grateful to God for these relationships built on trust and respect and care.

2022 was a year of tentative steps into an unknown future for MCM, with all the surprises and opportunities this brings. The easing of pandemic protections but with the pandemic still present, along with political, social, and economic uncertainties among us and around

us, have prompted congregations to ask identity and mission questions afresh. Who is God calling us to be and what is God calling us to do in these days?

Faith and Life Choirs, Christmas 2022

One result of this reflection has been a greater desire to engage in God's mission for the church. Our new Director of Mission Engagement, Melanie Neufeld, has walked with congregations as they explore possibilities. Many congregations, some with the assistance of a Local Mission Grant from MCM, have stepped out in faith and love to sponsor refugees, open food banks, establish community centres or resource hubs, and more. Congregations have also looked to wider missional involvement through our regional working groups such as the Mennonite Coalition for Indigenous Solidarity, the Climate Action Working Group, and the Palestine-Israel Network, or through partnering with International Witness workers or ministries.

Our Camps with Meaning summer program was back in full swing, led by Director Dorothy

Fontaine and our full-time Camp staff. Supported by 109 volunteers, leaders in training, and summer staff, Camp Assiniboia and Camp Koinonia welcomed 523 campers this summer, including our

Adults with Disabilities programs. MCM also supported five young adults to attend the Global Youth Summit as part of the Mennonite World Conference Assembly in Indonesia, and we supported youth and leader participants from MCM in the Young Leaders Experience at MC Canada's Gathering in Edmonton.

A key aspect of our mutual support as MCM is our care for pastors and congregations. Rick Neufeld retired in March as Director of Leadership Ministries, and in August Karen Schel-

> lenberg and Jeff Friesen stepped into this role as Co-Directors. Together they have walked with our 50+ pastors and other spiritual leaders through challenging

times in 2022, and encouraged 5 people toward licensing or ordination. Kathy Giesbrecht has now had a full year as Director of Congregational Ministries, and she has walked with congregations seeking support in congregational care and faith formation. We are grateful also for the return of in-person church visits and concerts by our Faith and Life Choirs, an important aspect of our congregational ministries.

Who is God calling us to be and what is God calling us to do in these days? This is a question not just for congregations but for us as a regional church. "These days" are indeed filled with uncertainties; the future is very much unknown. Yet as we walk together in these days, we do not walk alone. Jesus is with us each step of the way. Let us draw strength and hope from this promise.

We prayerfully support one another, joining together in ministry alongside the other congregations of Mennonite Church Canada and Mennonite World Conference, trusting that as we do God's healing and hope flows through us to all the world.

January 2022 welcomed MC Sask into a season of many changes. Longtime leaders moved into new ministries (**Ryan Siemens**) or into a season of intense parenting (**Kirsten Hamm-Epp**). Meanwhile, others began new roles, **Zach Dueck** as Interim Youth Leader and **Josh Wallace** as Interim Executive Minister. Office Administrator **Marianne Siemens** and moderator **Terry Stefaniuk** put in extra hours as anchors of continuity and stability.



Our congregations, too, were in the midst of change. As COVID-19 continued to shift, some congregations found themselves with renewed for new projects while others faced anew questions of longterm sustainability. Many found themselves somewhere in-between. At the close of January 2022, **Grace MC** in Prince Albert gathered for a final worship service before gifting their building to Parkland Restorative Justice.

In March, we were welcomed by **Youth Farm Bible Camp** and online for our Annual Delegate Sessions, centred on our congregations *Called to Here*. Pastor Preston Pouteaux helped frame our work of discernment and decisions within God's joyful presence among our neighbors in the communities where we make our homes.

MC Sask affirmed the calls of **Kevin Koop** (Carrot River MC) and **Rachel Wallace** (Eigenheim MC), joining with their congregations to ordain them to pastoral ministry. We rejoiced together with **North Star MC** in the conclusion of the faithful service of **Dan Graber** and in the appointment of **Lisa Martens Bartel** as Pastoral Leader. Likewise, we gave thanks for the years of faithful ministry by **Nora Pederberg** at **Osler MC** and for the installation of **Luke Bushman** as Pastor of Faith and Community at **Osler MC** and **Nutana Park MC**.

Gatherings in the summer months renewed our connections to the nationwide and global body of Jesus. We were grateful for **Nora Pederberg** stepping in to be MC Sask's delegate to the Mennonite World Conference's Global Youth Summit and Assembly in Indonesia. We supported together 13 delegates to carry the hopes and perspectives to MC Canada's Gathering 2022 in Edmonton. **Mel Harms** led an enthusiastic group of MC Sask youth in participating in the nationwide **Amplify** youth gathering. These events open pathways for our congregations to join in solidarity, action, praise, and prayer with sisters and brothers in Christ nearby and around the world.



This year MC Sask has sought to resource congregations for local ministry and collaboration through a few new initiatives. Our March ADS approved a Camping Ministry Study to review and strengthen our shared ministry through MC Sask's three camps (Camp Elim, Youth Farm Bible Camp, and Shekinah Retreat Center). The newly developed Climate Emergency Response Team (CERT) is developing resources and proposals to help congregations live in faith and faithful action for the good of all creation. And in November we welcomed Dr Sylvia Keesmaat to resource congregational leaders as they preach and reflect on Scripture in changing times.

Through transitions, expected and unexpected, joyful and sorrowful, the God of peace remains faithfully near to us, supporting each of our congregations in MC Sask and tenderly caring for all the world. Thank you for partnering with us in this work of peace.

Reflections on an amazing year!

The headline read, "So long, 2022, let us hope 2023 will be better." Every New Year's it's the same thing: newspapers, comic pages, and blog posts emphasize the negative as they reflect on the year that was. Lists of the year's top news events are filled with stories of disaster. New Year's resolutions focus thoughts on our personal inadequacies. The turning of the calendar is seen as turning toward a future that couldn't possibly be as bad as what we just went through. It is such a pattern that on January 3rd a satirical news website offered that Canadians were already giving up on 2023, choosing to pin their hopes on 2024 instead!

As I reflect back on 2022 I see many aspects that were difficult and challenging. But I also see so many positives – so many ways God's spirit of healing and hope was present in the world in real and tangible ways:

- The ebbing of the COVID pandemic allowed MCA's congregations to reconnect as communities in ways that had not been possible for nearly two years. A highlight for me was the in-person **Gathering** of our Mennonite Church Canada faith family in Edmonton this past summer.
- The calling of pastoral leadership for Foothills, Holyrood, Bethel, and First
 Mennonite Edmonton; the calling of volunteers and staff both young and old to the
 ministry at Camp Valaqua; and the calling of many others in service of
 congregations and the broader ministries we share.
- The living out of the 3rd year of MCA's action plan: Encountering, Embracing, Embodying Christ in the World. As congregations reconnect and reset, many are looking for ways to be more present in their local communities. Globally, International Witness continues to build the church in 15 countries. This includes pastor supports and training in Thailand and Ethiopia. MCA is also funding pastor training for 2 church leaders from South Sudanese refugee camps.
- Seeing efforts made towards peace and wholeness of relationship in a world torn by division, injustice, and environmental destruction. MCA's Bridge Building Facilitator is nurturing intercultural and interfaith relationships, while our nationwide church has invested in staff to assist in caring for creation and building relationships with Indigenous people.

The MENNONITE CHURCH BRITISH COLUMBIA (MCBC) Story Submitted to the Nationwide Regional Churches for 2022

"Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love." 1 John 4:7-8

2022 has been a year of delayed expectations for MCBC. In September 2021 Garry Janzen announced his plans to retire as Executive Minister around the time of his 65th birthday in July 2022. A fantastic search task group was formed. They did thorough preparations of the understandings that would guide the search for a new Executive Minister. As the search got underway, applications were received, but none of them worked out. Garry extended his intended retirement date, eventually settling on the end of 2022. The second round of searching began in the fall of 2022. Again, applications were received. At the time of writing this report, mid-December 2022, there is hope. Yet, it has become clear that we will not have a new Executive Minister by January 1st, 2023. In response, Kevin Barkowsky will adjust his halftime position as Church Engagement Minister to include being Interim Executive Minister, with expectations that this could be a 3-6 month role.

As we wait for God's purposes to be worked out, we trust in God's love to lead the way. God is love, and God calls us to love one another according to this love (1 John 4:7-21). We continue in faithfulness and obedience as agents of God's love, trusting that as we wait, God's best will be revealed in due time.

In 2021 a new structure for MCBC was presented to the AGM, which received its final approval at the 2022 AGM. Task Groups have grown, and others have been formed. There is much that our people have said they care about and want to act on, and the work of our task groups reflects these interests. Our task groups are too numerous to name them all here. We give thanks for our Ministry Leaders: Andrew Haak (Cultivating Anabaptist Vision), Henry Krause (Engaging God's World) and Isaías Rodriguez (Growing Community). They report on the work in their ministry area quarterly. As Leadership Board members they also help with giving overall direction to MCBC.

As a Nationwide Mennonite Church, we have said that the local congregation is the foundational unit of the church. In MCBC it has been brought to our attention that we still need to figure out how the participants in our task groups can help their congregations embrace the work of the task groups they are in. One of our congregations took a Sunday to celebrate the work of MCBC and their people who are involved. This gave the MCBC Executive Minister opportunity to preach and speak about MCBC; it also gave Task Group and Leadership Board participants from the congregation the opportunity to talk about what they do. Each of our congregations is encouraged to do something like this.

The work that we do together nationwide and globally is represented in our Engaging God's World ministry area. We are thankful for the partnership we have in order to be able to do ministry that we each would not be able to do on our own. In MCBC we are thankful for the growing connection we are building with Evangelical Mennonite Church Vietnam. This is a relationship through MC Canada and the North American Vietnamese Evangelical Fellowship and is an extension of our relationship with the Vietnamese congregations we have in MCBC.

The 2023 MCBC Annual Gathering will be at Peace Mennonite Church in Richmond on February 25th; it will also be available for Livestream viewing. We will be having a LEAD Conference Friday, February 24th – Mark Baker from Fresno Pacific Biblical Seminary will be speaking on themes from his new book, <u>Centered-Set Church</u>. New information regarding the future of the former Clearbrook Mennonite Church property will be presented at this gathering.
