#### Youth Ministry Dream Team, April 2019 to April 2020

#### 1. Work of the team

Over the last year, the following work has been done:

- formation of the team from MCEC constituent pastors, camps, schools, churches and youth to meet monthly.
- the primary task has been consideration of youth ministry in MCEC.
- review of the visioning work already accomplished and resulting in the vision statement,
   "Investing in intentional, unconditional relationships with youth; walking with them towards a fearless faith in Christ Jesus."
- review of MCEC Children & Youth Census 2016 collected and compiled by Jessica Reesor Rempel.
- creation and distribution of an online survey to MCEC pastors, youth workers, parents, sponsors, Sunday School teachers, volunteers who interact with youth and junior youth and junior youth.
- listened to pastors, youth workers and sponsors at events such as Make a Difference Day (for junior youth) and Fall Youth Retreat.
- formation of regional teams of young adults to listen to congregational youth and youth leaders share about their personal and group experience and their relationship to MCEC.

## 2. Some early findings

The following findings arose out of the work described above:

- 72 of 101 MCEC congregations in the 2016 census, had:
  - o **632** children 0-5 yrs.; **1,056** children 6-13 yrs.; **505** youth 14-17 yrs.; **485** young adults 18-21 yrs. A total of **2,678**.
- of 72 congregations responding to the 2016 census:
  - o 4% had no children to young adults
  - 54% had 1-30 children to young adults
  - o 26% had 31-70 children to young adults
  - o 15% had 81-160 children to young adults
- the issues that emerged include: large issues of justice and peace (i.e., climate change, poverty, sexuality and LGBTQ inclusion); connecting and building social networks with others; enjoyment of intergenerational relationships; ambivalent faith identities and interests; limited to no awareness of MCEC and MCEC activities for youth.

# 3. Some early thoughts and concerns

- with a membership of 13,206 in 2016, having at least **2,678** children to young adults associated with MCEC congregations ought to give us pause to consider how they are part of MCEC.
- we celebrate the inclusion of these people as part of MCEC. This is good news.
- with the majority (54%) of congregations in 2016 having smaller sized youth groups, we wonder how to best support them in a way that shares resources equitably across MCEC.
- most of MCEC's support of this cohort of children to young adults has been done through ad hoc activities, often planned by camp and school staff with MCEC contracted personnel.
- most of this cohort's relationship with MCEC has been through schools and camps which has nurtured good loyalty to the schools and camps for those who have participated in them.
- awareness and understanding of MCEC is limited to non-existent for most of this cohort. Is
   MCEC as a whole interested in and have a reason to nurture a relationship with this cohort?

- raising leaders for MCEC from this cohort will be more difficult than previous generations who had memory of and engagement with MCEC structures and programs.
- faith formation and sense of peoplehood seems to be mostly a commitment to a set of values such as peace-making, community living. Where these values come from and why MCEC might hold to them do not seem to be clear to this cohort.

### 4. A proposal

The Youth Ministry Dream Team proposes the development and hiring of a position in Youth and Young Adult Ministry with the goal of:

- further facilitation of vision for youth and young adult ministry in MCEC and its congregations.
- creative support of each congregation in its ministry with youth.
- sensitive and effective support of faith nurture among MCEC youth, young adults and their congregations.
- growth and support of a network of relationships between youth and young adults of MCEC
- plan and implement activities for nurture and resourcing of youth and their congregations, i.e., retreats, leadership development, etc.
- creating and/or collecting resources that youth ministries can use.
- maintenance of an appropriate and useful social media presence.
- rebuild a Youth Ministry Council for the purpose of:
  - further development of the vision of MCEC's junior youth, youth and young adult ministry.
  - o giving direction to, planning and implementing the various activities of MCEC ministry in this area.
  - developing leadership gifts and experiences among a diverse and representative group
    of youth and young adults from MCEC congregations. Drawing from every cluster of
    MCEC congregations, with a majority of youth (perhaps 9), several adults active in youth
    ministry (perhaps 4), and the person hired in this position (perhaps named as MCEC
    Youth Minister).
- We recommend that this be a 1.0 FTE ministerial position.
