





Stories from Southern Africa

What is happening in the church in Southern Africa? How is God moving in Southern African neighbourhoods? Be challenged and inspired as we connect with the church in Southern Africa through this amazing woman.

Barbara Nkala, Mennonite World Conference, Zimbabwe



Barbara is a renowned writer and publisher. She is a Mennonite World Conference regional representative for Southern Africa and was the Mistress of Ceremonies at MWC 14th Assembly in Bulawayo. As a professional editor, translator and church leader, she has enormously contributed to the growth of local indigenous languages and was one of the earliest female writers published in Zimbabwe.

Her career as an author began in 1970, as a student at Gweru Teachers' College, when she won a national writing competition with her novel *Qilindini*. That initial book was a detective thriller written in her first language, Ndebele. She has continued to write in Ndebele, focusing on the inherent strength of women to rise above discrimination and ignorance.

She obtained a Diploma in Education with the University College of Rhodesia (Zimbabwe), then a Bachelor of Arts in English and Communication with the University of South Africa (UNISA), and a Master of Arts in Leadership and Management with Africa Leadership and Management Academy (ALMA). She taught in various secondary schools in the country before joining Longman Zimbabwe in 1981,

where she rose to commissioning editor for humanities texts. As National Director of International Bible Society Zimbabwe (IBS Zimbabwe) in Zimbabwe and Malawi, she coordinated the translation and publishing of the new IBS Shona and Ndebele Bibles; as well as a Chichewa New Testament. She is the founder and managing editor of Radiant Publishing, whose vision is to publish for transformation.

Barbara is an author of fiction and non-fiction titles, published in both Ndebele and English. Some of her books have been used as school textbooks. She is a frequent public speaker, an elder and a Sunday school teacher in her Brethren in Christ congregation in Harare, Zimbabwe. She has sat on many humanitarian boards. Barbara is married to Shadreck Nkala and they have three adult children and five grandchildren.

Wazir Ally, The Gathering Church (Kitchener, ON)



Wazir is on the Board of Directors at The Gathering Church. He coordinates and maintains the technical upkeep of The Gathering's website, Sunday morning tech set up, and training. He is an educator in the children's ministry.

He is an IT professional, working in the high-tech industry field for an organization based in the states, PTC.

He and his wife live in Baden, ON with their young family. At the time of this printing, they are a family of four with another child on the way, due mid-April! In his spare time, Wazir loves camping, road trips and traveling/exploring various places on the map with family and friends.

Matthew Bailey-Dick, Anabaptist Learning Workshop Coordinator



Matthew is the Coordinator of the Anabaptist Learning Workshop (an educational program of Mennonite Church Eastern Canada in cooperation with Conrad Grebel University College) which involves organizing workshops, public speaking, program evaluation, and consulting with participants and instructors.

Matthew is also a PhD candidate in Adult Education and Community Development at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE) at the University of Toronto. He received a master's degree in peace studies from Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary (Elkhart, Indiana) and a bachelor's degree in religious studies from the University of Waterloo. Matthew has pastored in two Mennonite congregations, Erb St. Mennonite Church and Waterloo-Kitchener United Mennonite Church, as well as with MCEC as the Minister of Peace & Justice Evangelism.

Brian Bauman, MCEC Mission Minister



Brian has served as MCEC mission minister since 2003 and is often known as the Mission Guy. He focuses on missional church development and specializes in working with new church plants, church adoptions and inter-cultural ministry within MCEC. Brian and his wife Nancy are members of First Mennonite Church in Kitchener, where Nancy is pastor.

Brian began his ministry at Preston Mennonite Church from 1983 - 1988. He and Nancy pastored together at First Mennonite Church in Reedley, California. Brian became conference minister in the Pacific Southwest Mennonite Conference in the USA before returning to MCEC in 2003.

Palmer Becker, MCEC Palestine-Israel Working Group



Palmer Becker has spent a lifetime serving the Mennonite Church as a pastor, church planter, conference executive, author and educator. He has taught leadership and pastoral care courses in Israel and Palestine. His most recent teaching engagement was in Gaza immediately after the 2014 war. Palmer is the co-author of the *Resolution on Palestine and Israel* adopted by the delegate body of Mennonite Church Canada in July 2016.

He also is the author of *Pathways to Peace and Justice for Palestine and Israel*, which is the primary education guide for Mennonite congregations on implementing the resolution. He and his wife attend Waterloo North Mennonite Church.

Ruth Boehm, Faith Mennonite Church (Leamington)



Ruth Boehm is pastor at Faith Mennonite Church. She is a trained spiritual director and marvels at how God's Spirit renews, strengthens and surprises individuals and the community. She delights in seeing people and groups discover their gifts and be their best as they care for themselves, others and the world.

Ruth pursued studies at Canadian Mennonite Bible College in Winnipeg and was invited in 1989 to work with youth and young adults at Bethel Mennonite Church in Winnipeg. She served there for 12 years. Ruth was the first woman ordained to pastoral ministry in Mennonite Church Manitoba on November 1, 1992. Upon completing her studies at Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary, Ruth moved to Gindiri, Nigeria with Mennonite Central Committee to teach at Gindiri College of Theology, a church leaders training facility. In 2005 she accepted the call to pastor at Faith Mennonite Church. Ruth and her family live in Leamington, ON.

Steve Cox, The Gathering Church (Kitchener)



Steve is lead pastor at The Gathering Church. He has a passion to help people find wholeness by putting their hands into Jesus' hands. Steve grew up in downtown Kitchener and studied at Wilfrid Laurier University, where he received a Bachelor's of Business Administration. He then felt called to pursue ministry and received his Master's of Divinity in Pastoral Studies at Tyndale Seminary in Toronto. Steve has served as young adult pastor at Agincourt Pentecostal Church in Scarborough, and then 12 years as the associate pastor of Niagara United Mennonite Church, before accepting the lead role at The Gathering Church.

Steve also enjoys consuming audio books, trying to stay fit, playing with his two energetic boys, and sharing conversation over coffee with his wife, Christina.

Norm Dyck, MCEC Mission Engagement Minister



Norm, as mission engagement minister, provides leadership to ReLearning Community and will connect new and established congregations with mission opportunities in the local, regional and nationwide church bodies.

He began his ministry as a lay leader at Steinbach Mennonite Church in Manitoba and then served as pastor at Graysville Mennonite Church in Manitoba from 2001 - 2008. He worked at Mennonite Church Canada as executive secretary, church engagement/ director of congregational partnerships from 2008 - 2011. Norm and his family moved to Ontario in 2011; Norm pastored at Listowel Mennonite Church from 2011 – 2018. He has served as board/council chair with Mennonite Church Canada Witness and MCEC Mission Council. He holds a Master's of Theological Studies from Conrad Grebel College and a Bachelor's of Church Ministry, Pastoral Theology from Canadian Mennonite University.

Jacquie East, West Hills Mennonite Fellowship (Baden)



Jacquie East is a stay-at-home mom with a Social Service Worker diploma from Conestoga College who lives in Baden, ON with her husband Sean and their four children TJ, Daniel, Rebekah, and Emma. She has worked the last seven plus years alongside Sean in providing leadership to West Hills Fellowship, a small MCEC congregation west of Kitchener where Sean is the pastor. Jacquie and has been very involved in putting Relearning Community ideas into practice in her home and in the church. Her passion is for her family and her church family to be able to live life together as *Family on Mission*, and in particular, to partner with God in engaging the communities in which she participates with the good news of Christ.

Rachelle Friesen, MCEC Palestine-Israel Working Group



Rachelle Friesen, is chair of the MCEC Palestine-Israel Working Group. She has experienced first-hand the realities of tensions in the Middle East after being detained and then deported from Israel because of her contact with Palestinians. She had been working with Palestinians as a service worker for Mennonite Central Committee and worked in Palestine for four years, including multiple visits to Gaza. Rachelle is currently Canada Coordinator for Christian Peacemaker Teams. Her work involves everything from administrative tasks like data entry and writing grant proposals, reaching out to CPT's constituency, organizing training sessions, supporting CPT workers, and speaking at rallies. She holds an MA in social and political thought from York University, Toronto.

Alicia Good, North Leamington United Mennonite Church



Alicia, an ordained pastor, has ministered at North Leamington United Mennonite Church since 2013. She is a self-named "genuine church nerd." She is excited by the challenges and opportunities that are part of ministry in the post-modern, post-Christian era. Alicia is an MCEC representative on the MC Canada joint council. She is also a member of the Anabaptist Learning Workshop steering committee.

She graduated with her M.Div. (Honours) from seminary at the University of Toronto, Wycliffe College. Before moving to Leamington, Alicia served as a street pastor with Mennonite Central Committee while she attended Toronto United Mennonite Church.

Steve Heinrichs, MC Canada Director of Indigenous-Settler Relations



Steve is the Director of Indigenous-Settler Relations and is passionate about the church's call to solidarity and reconciliation with our host peoples. He is a white settler Christian who has spent years working as an activist, pastor, and advocate for justice alongside indigenous peoples.

A former pastor in the Carrier territory of northern British Columbia, he loves to help congregations tackle not only with the important issues that keep peoples and nations apart, but also with the great hope and promise of life done together. Steve is an author and editor of *Buffalo Shout, Salmon Cry* - a book that grapples with the hope and promise with life done together as First Nations and settler peoples. A former reservist with Christian Peacemaker Teams in Palestine, Steve and his family live in Treaty 1 Territory, in Winnipeq, Manitoba.

Arli Klassen, MCEC Moderator Elect



Arli is moderator elect for MCEC and has served on the executive council since 2016. She is chief development officer and coordinator of regional representatives for Mennonite World Conference. She is passionate about following Jesus, the church, leadership, management, good governance, fundraising, and cross-cultural relationships. Arli was the first ReLearning Community project manager for MCEC from 2014-2015 and was integral in starting that initiative. She also worked with The Village International Mennonite Church as a mission associate. She was executive director for Mennonite Central Committee from 1999 - 2007 in MCC Ontario and 2009 - 2012 MCC Bi-national.

Arli holds a master's degree in social work from the University of Toronto and a bachelor's degree in sociology and religious studies from the University of Winnipeg where she studied theology at Mennonite Brethren Bible College. She is currently the chair of the Ten Thousand Villages Canada board. She lives in Kitchener, ON and attends First Mennonite Church.

Jehn Lian, Myanmar Missions International



Jehn Lian (Pastor Jehu) was lead pastor of Chin Christian Church in Kitchener, ON until 2016. He is now the Assistant Director of Myanmar Missions International. Well known as a "Mennonite Apostle," Jehu has travelled extensively sharing faith from an Anabaptist perspective to Chin people throughout the world. He was part of the translation/editing team of the *Hakha-Chin Confession of Faith in an Anabaptist Perspective* – printed just in time to take to Myanmar on the MCEC teaching and preaching tour in February.

Jehu is the founding pastor of Chin Christian Church in India. He and his wife, Ma, live in Kitchener with their family.

David Martin, MCEC Executive Minister



David has served as executive minister of Mennonite Church Eastern Canada since 2005. As executive minister he is involved in many aspects of the broader church family, most recently as part of the executive staff group of MC Canada. Faith in God has always been important to David from his roots in a rural congregation in Lively, ON at Waters Mennonite Church to present. He has a deep love for the Church, serving for over 25 years as pastor in several MCEC congregations: Stirling Avenue Mennonite Church, Hagerman Mennonite Church and Waterloo-Kitchener United Mennonite Church.

David holds an MDiv in biblical studies and theology from Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary and a Hons BA in religious studies from Conrad Grebel College. He resides in Kitchener with his wife, Doris, and in the winter you will find him in the local curling rink or traveling to spend as much time as possible with his beautiful grandchildren.

Yoel Masyawong, Grace Lao Mennonite Church (Kitchener)



Yoel has served as pastor at Grace Lao Mennonite Church since 2004. He volunteers with MCEC as a Mission Associate to multi-cultural pastors in the KW area and was a former member of leadership council. He has planned and travelled with pastors to Thailand and Myanmar on two preaching and teaching tours.

Yoel is from Chiang Mai, Thailand where he graduated from Bangkok Bible College and Seminary in 2001. He served as a youth pastor in Bangkok, Thailand for a couple of years before coming to Canada the first time under the International Visitor Exchange Program (IVEP) of Mennonite Central Committee. Yoel took a pastoral internship at both Shantz Mennonite Church, Baden ON and House of Friendship, Kitchener ON. He then returned to Thailand and ministered among students in Chiangmai University for another two years before accepting the call for the pastoral position with Grace Lao Mennonite Church. He and his family live in Kitchener.

Colin McCartney, LTURN Coordinator



Colin provides biblical instruction from an Anabaptist perspective, leadership training and mentoring to nurture young leaders in the MCEC initiative Leadership Training for Under Resourced Urban Neighbourhoods (LTURN). He walks with them as they plant and grow faith communities that impact and transform their neighbourhoods.

Colin is the founder of Urban Promise Toronto and current president and founder of Connect Ministries which exists to connect young leaders to God's mission in Toronto's most vulnerable communities through church planting and revitalization of dying innercity churches. Colin is married to Judith McCartney and they have two children.

Willard Metzger, MC Canada, Executive Minister



Willard has served as executive minister of Mennonite Church Canada since 2010. He was a member of the steering committee that realigned the General Conference of Mennonites and the Conference of Mennonites in Canada into MC Canada and the area churches in 2000 and was chair of MC Canada Witness for 10 years. Willard has ministered as a pastoral leader in MCEC at Bethel Mennonite Church (Elora), Floradale Mennonite Church, Glen Allan Mennonite Church and Community Mennonite Fellowship (Drayton). After his pastoral ministry he went to World Vision Canada to work as its national church relations director. He then accepted the call to Mennonite Church Canada as executive minister in 2010.

Willard received a Bachelor's of Theology degree from Emmanuel Bible College, Kitchener, ON.; a Bachelor's of Arts in Sociology from the University of Waterloo, ON.; a Master's of Theological Studies from Conrad Grebel University College, Waterloo; and a Doctor of Ministry from Ashland Theological Seminary, Ohio.

Randell Neudorf, The Commons (Hamilton)



Randell is an ordained pastor of The Commons. He is also on the MCEC executive council. He is an outreach worker at RE-create Art Studio in Hamilton where he helps youth discover their creativity. Palestine-Israel Working Group

The Palestine-Israel Working Group is providing resources to MCEC congregations in response to the resolution on Palestine-Israel that was adopted at the 2016 Mennonite Church Canada Assembly in Saskatoon. Kathy Bergen has spent the past 35 years working for a just peace between Palestinians and Israelis. Indigenous-Settler Working Group

Rainham Mennonite Church - 225 years

In 1792 Jacob Hoover was 63 years of age. He and several sons travelled to Ontario, Canada from Pennsylvania by horseback. He purchased 2,500 acres of land along the north shore of Lake Erie, near the village of Selkirk. In 1793 the families joined them and settled the area. A deed, dated 1836, shows that a little more than one acre of Hoover's land was given to the Mennonite Society (specifically Benjamin Hoover, Henry Miller and John Fry) for a church and cemetery. At that time it was the only church in the township. Rainham was one of the locations where John S. Coffman held revival meetings in 1891 and 10 people were added to the membership. In 1925 when C. F. Derstine held meetings at the church, the school next door was cancelled for the afternoon so that the children could attend the meeting. Rainham has also participated in sponsoring refugees, not only Mennonites from Russia in 1924 - 26, but also refugees from southeast Asia in 1980.

Jane Finch Faith Community - 25 years

Mennonite Church Eastern Canada - 30 years

In 1988, the churches of MCEC made an historic decision to integrate three streams of Mennonite history into one vibrant church so that together we could more faithfully respond to God's call. The Mennonite Conference of Ontario and Quebec, the Western Ontario Mennonite Conference, and the Conference of United Mennonite Churches in Ontario officially became Mennonite Conference of Eastern Canada on March 1,1988. Today we are a growing inter-cultural church of 110 faith communities who reflect the broad diversity of eastern Canada as we together extend Christ's peace to our neighbours across the street and around the world.



Riverdale Mennonite Church - 71 Years of Ministry Closed August 31, 2017

The Riverdale Mennonite congregation at Millbank, Ontario, formerly known as Riverdale Amish Mennonite Church, began as a mission in a former Presbyterian church, purchased in 1946 by the Mission Board of the Ontario Amish Mennonite Conference. A number of Mennonite families from surrounding congregations, including Poole Mennonite Church and Maple View Mennonite, began to worship in the church. In January 1948 Menno Zehr was ordained minister, and in June 1948 a congregation was organized with about 60 charter members. We celebrate the rich congregational life and years of faithful ministry in the Millbank area.

20 MCEC Peace & Justice Working Groups

Palestine-Israel Working Group

The Palestine-Israel Working Group is providing resources to MCEC congregations in response to the resolution on Palestine-Israel that was adopted at the 2016 Mennonite Church Canada Assembly in Saskatoon. The group has already sponsored a workshop for those interested in this issue and are building relationships with both Israelis and Palestinians, as well as responding to requests for congregational resourcing on this issue.

36 Property Update

74 Firvalley Court, Scarborough, ON

n April 2011, MCEC delegates authorized the Executive Council to divest the MCEC owned property located at 74 Firvalley Court in Scarborough by May 1, 2012. The 2011 resolution authorized the Executive Council to work towards selling the property to Warden Woods Community Centre at a discounted price that reflected the historical relationship between MCEC and Warden Woods.

In February 2012, Warden Woods Community Centre initiated legal action against MCEC and asserted its position that the property is owned by Warden Woods and that MCEC is simply holding the property in trust on its behalf. Since then, MCEC and Warden Woods have tried to resolve their differences without going to court. Last year, an understanding was achieved that would grant Warden Woods a 49-year lease at no cost. In return Warden Woods has acknowledged that MCEC is the rightful owner of the property. The lease with Warden Woods requires that they pay all costs associated with the property (capital costs, maintenance, insurance, etc.). Warden Woods was also given first right of refusal to purchase the property from MCEC at 50% of its then market value. In addition, MCEC has free access to the facility for use by a church or other affiliated partner. Further, MCEC also is able to exercise a right to place two directors on the Warden Woods board of governors. This resolution was approved at our 2017 Annual Church Gathering and the executive council was authorized to implement the decision.

I am pleased to report that the resolution passed last year has been fully implemented. MCEC now has a legally binding lease that governs the 49-year term during which Warden Woods has free access to the facility at 74 Firvalley. Warden Underground, an MCEC church plant under the leadership of Pastor Jordan Thoms, is now using the space for worship and programming. The hope of both MCEC and WWCC is that the settlement of this legal dispute will provide the basis of a renewed working relationship. The engagement of Warden Underground with the community centre offers the opportunity for collaboration that can promote the charitable purposes of both Warden Woods and MCEC. We are grateful for how God has been at work to support resolution efforts and pray that 74 Firvalley may continue to be a project that promotes God's mission in the Warden community.



Legacy Initiatives Fund Project Descriptions

AMBS - Deep Faith support

An Anabaptist Faith Formation Conference (October 2016) - This was the first of its kind: a formation conference for and by Anabaptist formation leaders. The conference gathered Anabaptist pastors, teachers and lay leaders to re-imagine what faith formation ministry looks like in this century through theology, relationship and practice.

AMBS Pastors Week Travel Bursary

Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary holds an annual pastors week in February.

Anabaptist Centres of Influence/Catalyzer

Connecting Mennonite leaders and congregations in Ottawa and the surrounding region so that they can support each other in their respective ministries and collaborate in inviting others to follow Jesus from an Anabaptist/ Mennonite perspective.

Anabaptist Learning Workshop

MCEC has partnered with Conrad Grebel University College to offer an innovative approach to learning about Anabaptist Mennonite faith and practice.

Conrad Grebel University College and Rockway Mennonite Collegiate Diversity Awards

Supporting an investment by Mary Groh, MCEC has helped establish funds at both schools to breakdown barriers for newcomer Canadians to attend.

Congregational Equipping - Informed Conversations

Helping congregations explore what matters to them, see how they are prepared already, and focus on how they will follow God's encouragement into this new era with this resource developed by MCEC staff and Credence & Co. Testing in congregations in the first year was funded allowing valuable feedback for improving this resource soon available to all congregations.

Constituency Youth Database Development

MCEC surveyed every congregation for the number of children and youth in their congregation. This information is extremely useful to camps and schools as they make decisions about where to recruit and share their stories.

Emerging Voices Initiative - Travel Subsidy to MC Canada Assembly

EVI began in January 2016 at Canadian Mennonite University by responding to the Future Directions Task Force final report.

Expanded ESL Training for Church Leaders

Expand the current teaching and training program offered in Spanish to other languages in MCEC.

Faith Formation Funding for Conrad Grebel University College, UMEI Christian High School and Rockway Mennonite Collegiate

Funding for bursaries have had a positive impact on our high schools. MCEC will provide one-time financial support that is matched by school donors in order to provide greater accessibility for MCEC students to receive a faith-based high school education.

Faith Formation Funding for Hidden Acres Mennonite Camp and Retreat Centre, Ontario Mennonite Music Camp, Silver Lake Mennonite Camp and Willowgrove

Each of MCEC's four camps supplemented their programming related to faith formation in campers. Faith development at each of the camps remains a priority as MCEC has provided three years of funding for priority projects at each camp.

Lebold Endowment

A \$250,000 gift was given to the endowment from the Legacy Initiatives Fund. Harold Schmidt was on the original fundraising committee for the Lebold Endowment in 1997. This gift boosted the endowment over the one million dollar mark.

Live-Streaming of Events

Technology will make it easier for distant congregations to participate in MCEC learning opportunities and meetings.

MennoMedia - Hymnal Project Support

MCEC contributed to the new Hymnal Project. The Hymnal will be published by Herald Press.

MennoMedia - In Search of Promised Lands: A Religious History of Mennonites in Ontario Sam Steiner's book, published in 2015, provides a comprehensive religious history of Mennonites in Ontario. Support went toward publication costs.

Mission Ana Baptist Church (Myanmar)

Exploration continues as the relationships between Myanmar and MCEC develops. Investments include a capital project in Hakka and itineration for preachers and speakers.

Missional Network Leadership Training (Going Local)

Under the leadership of two MCEC pastors, Going Local is an initiative that invited lay leaders to support each other as they look for signs of God's activity in the local community and then ask how God might be inviting them to join what God is doing in the world.

MSDEC Pastor Support Group Pilot Project

Mennonite Spiritual Directors of Eastern Canada launched an initiative for six pastors. The project can be described as *Practicing Congregational Ministry from a Spiritual Guidance Stance*. Content included understanding a congregation's soul, self-care, and missional church from a spiritual guidance perspective.

Mennonite World Conference Assembly Travel Bursary

Mennonite World Conference assembly was held in Pennsylvania in 2015.

Mennonite World Conference Communications Grant

Assistance with MWC's website development, database and abilities to provide translated material in non-European languages.

Pastors in Exile Support

PiE helps young adults on the margins of the church explore questions of faith and how they might live it out authentically in their community. PiE is in Kitchener-Waterloo but learnings may be transferable to other areas of MCEC.

Peace Conference Sponsorship

MCEC was a sponsor of the Global Peace Festival hosted by Conrad Grebel University College, June 9 - 12, 2016. This conference and festival explored traditions and contemporary expressions of Anabaptist Mennonite peace beliefs and practices, gave expression to peace-building ideals through the arts, and invited us to assess and re-envision how we as Mennonites work at peace-building.

ReLearning Community

A two-year spiritual journey that will impact you, your congregation, and your local community. Teams of four to six people from congregations across MCEC are coached and learn how ordinary people can have ordinary conversations about Jesus with others in their faith community and with their neighbours.

Community of Practice

Congregations who have completed the full ReLearning Community cycle meet for prayer time, support and conversation as they continue to explore where God is calling them.

Scriptural Engagement Events

Reading the Bible with Jesus - Bryan Moyer Suderman, Willowgrove and Markham-Stouffville Mennonite Ministerial offered a series of four weekend retreats exploring the way Jesus is portrayed as interpreter of Scripture and the implications for our day.

Shalom Counselling Services Pastor Seminar

A pilot project at Shalom exploring new ways to support pastors.

Six Nations Truth and Reconciliation Commission Event

Sponsorships for young adults to participate in post TRC reconciliation event.

Skylight Festival Sponsorship

Founded in 2015 by people passionate about the arts, faith, and justice, Skylight is a celebratory and creative space where diverse communities connect to explore arts, faith, peace and justice.

South East Asia Teaching and Preaching Trips

Church leaders in Myanmar and Thailand invited Brian Bauman and Yoel Masyawong to come and teach what Mennonites believe. A growing number of MCEC congregations are newcomer Canadians, as well as first generation Anabaptists who want their home towns and villages to learn about Mennonite/Anabaptist faith.

Stuart Murray Learning Tour 2016

Stuart Murray from Urban Expressions, UK met with MCEC clusters to explore the experience and implications of post-Christendom in Britain and Canada; consider the role of church planting today and reflect on the contemporary significance of the Anabaptist vision. His time in Canada culminated in a Church Planter's Workshop and MCEC's Annual Church Gathering.

Ted & Co Indigenous Relations Play development

Four productions of *Discovery: A Comic Lament* will occur in Waterloo Region from May 31 to June 3, 2018. Taking a critical look at the Doctrine of Discovery, the play challenges audiences to confront the Doctrine's lasting impact on Indigenous peoples, and question their own settler stories.

Theatre of the Beat – Commissioning of #churchtoo

A play touring fall 2018 exploring themes of sexuality, power, and abuse.

Theatre of the Beat - Bicycle Built for Two

A playful reflection on marriage jointly commissioned by Shalom Counselling Services Waterloo and MCEC. This drama invited conversation about how to strengthen marriage relationships.

Translation Equipment

New equipment allows for multiple languages to be translated at once, easier transition between translators, and provides improved sound quality.

Translation of Confession of Faith into Hakka-Chin Language

Completed in February 2018, this resource was available to be taken to Myanmar on the most recent preaching and teaching trip. Also available for congregations across North America and globally.

Urban Young Adult Leadership Initiatives (LTURN)

The goal of this initiative is to identify young adult leaders in under resourced neighbourhoods in the GTA who are committed to following Jesus and living out their faith in their local community. Colin McCartney provides biblical instruction from an Anabaptist perspective, leadership training and mentoring to nurture these young leaders to plant and grow faith communities that impact and transform their neighbourhoods.

Video Production - ReLearning Community

Development and production of a promotional video for ReLearning Community. Participants reflect how God has changed them as they continue on the ReLearning Community journey.

Young Adult Learning Tour to the UK: Urban Expressions

An opportunity for young adult leaders to experience a variety of models of urban ministry and diverse expressions of church to equip and inspire them to become missional leaders in their home contexts.

54 MC Canada Update

he denominational renewal process called Future Directions: Covenant New concluded with the Special Assembly of Mennonite Church Canada (MC Canada) held in Winnipeg October 13 - 15, 2017. The delegate Assembly overwhelmingly approved the transition to a new structure and mandate for MC Canada. The newly revised structure is designed to bring the local congregation into closer relationship with the nationwide agenda that we share with our Regional Church partners.

The new structure revisions MC Canada as the covenant partnership created by the five nationwide Regional Churches. Working together, Regional Churches have been mandated to foster the health and vitality of local congregations, who are engaged in mission in their immediate neighbourhoods and around the world. At the Special Assembly, delegates celebrated a structure that served them well in the past and grieved its passing and, at the same time, embraced the vision of a vibrant, nationwide Mennonite Church that is actively engaging our world with the peace of Jesus Christ.

What actions were taken by the delegates?

- 1. A new Covenant was affirmed. Regional Churches pledge to work together in mission at home and around the world.
- A new bylaw for MC Canada was passed to implement our covenant commitments.
- A new Operating Agreement was commended to the new Joint Council (formerly General Board) to guide the work and mission of Regional Churches and congregations.
- Working Group Reports were commended to the Joint Council to further develop and refine the proposed structure.
- 5. A Financial Plan was recommended to the Joint Council for further action and development.

What is the focus of the new model?

- Local congregations are at the centre of mission.
- Regional Churches support congregations.
- Regional Churches work more closely together on a common mission.
- MC Canada supports the Regional Churches and connects them to international mission.



What does this mean for my congregation?

- The Regional Church will be your primary link to the nationwide church.
- Congregations are members of the Regional Church only.
- Regional Church delegates, elected by congregations at regional annual meetings, will represent congregations at the nationwide level.
- All funding for both the Regional Church and MC Canada now flows through the Regional Church.

Regional Churches will focus on:

- Connecting congregations to mission opportunities:
 *Local *Regional *Nationwide *International
- · Congregational health and vitality.
- Support and education for pastors.
- Training and support for church leaders.
- · Regional gatherings for worship, discernment, and fellowship.



MC Canada will focus on:



- Overseeing Canadian and International Witness initiatives
- Providing Mennonite/Anabaptist identity and theology
- Fostering a nationwide strategy for the calling and training of church leaders
- Nationwide gatherings where everyone is invited to celebrate our faith, learn together, be inspired, and discern how God is calling us to be a Mennonite church in mission
- Representing the Regional Churches to Mennonite World Conference, church agencies, other ecumenical and inter-faith bodies and the wider society.
- Supporting the Regional Churches and congregations with administrative resources such as pastors' salary guidelines as well as pension and health benefit plans for pastors.

Will we have new witness workers? How do I apply?

As Mennonite Church Canada receives new invitations, they will be explored with the congregations to see if there is sufficient support to respond positively. For information on our Witness Ministries contact your Regional Church or home.mennonitechurch.ca.

How are projects chosen?

The ESG & Joint Council have developed criteria that will be used to discern initial testing. If the invitation fits priorities, congregations and individuals will be invited to discern partnership.

How do you become a witness worker? Is there an application?

Support Questions

How are workers supported now?

Through our centralized budget and designated giving.

Why do you still need so much money if Witness Workers are raising half their financial support?

The central budget still needs to raise the other 50% of the Witness Ministries budget. The previous model was financially unsustainable.

Why did you change the model from full core funding to 50% relational funding?

To engage congregations and individuals more fully in international witness, and to work towards a more sustainable model.

Do current Witness Workers need to raise 50% of their budget?

Joint Council has developed a 3-year plan to enable existing Witness Workers to achieve their relational funding. (See the following question for further support structures.)

Do new Witness Workers need to have 50% to start their ministry?

Yes. Regional Churches will connect congregations and individual donors to enable Witness Workers to achieve the relational funding requirements. Witness Support Teams will also be created to help Workers achieve the 50%, and support the Worker and family, if applicable) in prayer, communication, and advocacy.

Do International Witness Workers have home congregations? If so, does the church also support them?

Yes all Witness Workers are supported by their home congregations.



Joint Council - The 'elected board' that is comprised of the Moderators from each Regional Church, and one other representative (member-at-large) from each region.

"God calls us to be followers of Jesus Christ, and by the power of the Holy Spirit to grow as communities of grace, joy, and peace, so that God's healing and hope flow through us to the world."

This has been a year of transition. Yet in the midst of significant staff reduction and restructuring, we have continued to position ourselves so that God's healing and hope can flow through us to the world.

Some of the program highlights of this past year:

Indigenous-Settler Relations

- Formal Name Change
 - o We are excited to announce that Indigenous Relations has been formally re-named Indigenous-Settler Relations (approved by Joint Council, December 2017). The change seeks to communicate to constituency and the broader public that our nationwide work is an effort to renew and repair mutual relationships between both Indigenous and Settler peoples.
- UNDRIP and Bill C-262
 - o In June 2015, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission called all Canadian churches to engage the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) within our respective constituencies and the broader Canadian public (Call to Action #48). According to the TRC Final Report, the Declaration is so important that it should be understood as the "framework for reconciliation" in Canada. In response, Mennonite Church Canada's Indigenous-Settler Relations program has sought to mobilize the church in support of the Declaration through teach-ins, two book resources (*Wrongs to Rights* and *Lifting Hearts off the Ground*), the Pilgrimage for Indigenous Rights, the Fast for Indigenous Rights, and a postcard campaign of over 35,000 cards.

A significant part of our education and advocacy efforts have been directed towards Bill C-262—An Act to Ensure that the Laws of Canada are in Harmony with the UNDRIP. A private members bill crafted by Romeo Saganash—Cree Member of Parliament (NDP) and residential school survivor—Bill C-262 would affirm that the Declarations' minimum standards for the survival of Indigenous peoples have legal application in Canada.

When Bill C-262 was initially introduced, many said that it would never get the support of the Government. Yet through the tireless work of grassroots advocacy—including Christian Peacemaker Teams and Mennonite Church Canada—the Government of Canada announced on November 20, 2017 that is it going to support the Bill. It is amazing news! We still have a ways to go before it receives 'royal assent' and thus becomes law. Yet if passed, Bill C-262 will be a tremendous step towards the liberating justice that Jesus proclaimed for the oppressed (Luke 4:18-19).

International Witness

Our International Witness work has continued to remain strong with 19 workers through this past year. Some highlights this year include;

- Peacebuilders Community Inc, PBCI, responded to violence in Marawi City, Mindanao with 288 Peace & Reconciliation (PAR) monitors in the affected region.

- The newly formed Mennonite Church South Korea, MCSK, hosted its second annual "Assembly" in September.
- Witness worker Bock Ki Kim is leading an effort to plant a new Anabaptist/Mennonite church in Seoul.
- Mike & Cheryl Nimz are helping to start a new Anabaptist group in Birmingham, England.
- Nathan and Taryn Dirks (after 5 years) completed their ministry in Botswana, leaving a great impact in the
 whole country for having built the first Futsal/sports park in Botswana. Mushroom cultivation was taught
 to women of the Grace Community of Churches (GCC) in South Africa. A brick making machine has also
 been purchased in collaboration with AIMM, MCC and MMN to help construct church buildings.
- Other workers include: Darnell & Christina Barkman (Philippines); Jeanette Hanson (Canada/China); Lillian & Norm Nicolson (Burkina Faso); Jennifer Otto & Greg Rabus (Germany); Tom & Christine Poovong (Thailand); Hippolyto & Miriam Tshimanga (South Africa); George & Tobia Veith (China).

We are grateful to report strong numbers in 2017 that reflect a growing ministry:

- Sales revenue, for the first 10 months of our current fiscal year, is up 27.6%. Online sales revenue is up 41%, including competitively priced MennoMedia titles and Mennonite Church Canada products.
- In 2018, 48% of items borrowed by congregations circulated outside Manitoba, including increases in MCBC, MCA and MCEC.
- 17.2% of all items borrowed in 2018 circulated outside Mennonite Church Canada, the highest percentage ever.
- Download totals increased 18% in 2018, including "Community Developed" titles contributed by congregations and others.

I'm grateful for the ways in which God has been at work in the church and in our lives. The theme for our Annual Gathering is both inspiring and daunting. In my ministry both in Mennonite Church Canada (Fairview Mennonite Home, Stirling Avenue Mennonite Church and East Zorra Mennonite Church) and Mennonite Church USA (Berkey Avenue Mennonite Fellowship, Goshen, IN), I've been in awe of the those moments in the church when our striving has been side by side with one mind: a vision for meaningful support, presence and engagement in the neighbourhood through a community BBQ, a community garden, supporting teachers and students at the local school, and grappling with the meaning of hospitality in a country where neighbours were vulnerable to deportation. And I've been challenged to recognize that we sometimes have different ideas for how to strive side by side with one mind. I continue to rely on the Holy Spirit to provide wisdom to navigate these differences, abundant love to see the good in the other, and sufficient grace to trust that we all desire to be faithful to the One who calls us. I look forward to my ministry in MCEC. God's call is surprising and challenging, full of twists and turns I couldn't have envisioned when I said 'yes'—first at my baptism, then again at my ordination. But God's grace has been abundant, filled with joy and blessings, assuring me that even when the way is hard, and the path seems uncertain, I do not walk this journey alone.
