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Youth Ministry in this Time of Physical Distancing

April 7, 2020 Zoom Meeting

Ideas from MCEC Youth Ministers/Workers/Sponsor

- Communicate with individual youth or as a group using Zoom, Instagram, Facebook messaging, etc. Zoom allows the host to choose breakout groups of a certain number to facilitate dialogue in small groups.
- Cup cake decorating while online with each other materials were prepared ahead and dropped off beforehand.
- Sharing "Rose (highs), Thorn (lows) and Buds (growth)" over Zoom
- Each youth builds a blanket fort and shares from their fort over Zoom. Gives a virtual tour of their fort as they share highs and lows.
- Yoga online together
- Watch Netflix together
- For low tech games, *Pictionary* or *Mafia* can be played while on Zoom with the host being the person who messages individuals with the clues to play.
- Youth have more time so they added a Bible study online as well as maintaining the regular youth event time to connect online.
- Important to connect with youth individually as well as with the whole group
- Youth make their own bingo card and then the host calls out the letter and number
- Bible scavenger hunt: They read a verse given by the host and then have to find something in their house that connects with the verse. They explain why they chose that item. Send out prizes like Uber Eats gift card.
- Musical potluck: Each participant chooses a music video to share and explains why the song is meaningful to them.
- Send out care packages or leave them at doorsteps. Can be to youth in the group or youth make them for seniors who are isolated as well as making encouraging cards to include in the packages.
- At the end of connecting over Zoom, leave the youth with a challenge to do that week, like connecting with someone they haven't connected with for a while.
- Bible study on lament, grief and anxiety to open conversations about how youth are feeling in order to validate their feelings of grief. Have youth also share good things they have heard or experienced and name glimpses of hope.
- Explore spiritual disciplines that can be shared with youth to help them reflect like guided meditation, memes and sharing Bible verses.
